Aims and Objectives

Farncombe Community Garden is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). The charitable objectives are stated in its constitution: -

To provide facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation by providing an area for use as a community garden for individuals in Farncombe and the surrounding area who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life of the said inhabitants.

Farncombe Community Garden is an ambitious project which aims to bring the local community together in the creation of a vibrant, beautiful, productive, and wildlife-friendly garden. It will be inclusive to all, seeking to share the health and well-being benefits of the outdoors, connecting people more closely to the natural world on our doorstep and encouraging community cohesion as individuals of all ages and backgrounds work together towards a common goal.

Vision and Mission

The project vision is to establish a working community garden within Farncombe for all the local residents to benefit from, whether it is through taking up gardening for the first time to aid recovery from a physical or mental health problem, finding purpose by volunteering in support

of the project, enjoying passing on a passion for gardening to others, or in education as people of all ages are encouraged to learn about horticulture and the importance of encouraging and supporting wildlife in an urban environment.

In planning the charity's activities the trustees have regarded the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

Organisational Structure

As well as the four trustees to oversee and give strategic direction to the project, there is a management team who meet regularly consisting of 6 volunteers with different areas of expertise.

The garden is run entirely by volunteers, who donate their time, skills and expertise to make the garden a welcoming, beautiful space for everyone to enjoy and learn from. We are very grateful for their support and commitment without which the garden would not exist.

Achievements and performance

The third year of the charity continued to be productive and transformative, both in terms of the site and also in promoting the garden to a wider audience. Over 100 different people have visited the garden over the past year and we are also increasing our numbers of regular visitors.

During the third year of the charity the key activities were as follows: -

- Erecting a building, the Lambert Lodge, named in memory of a long-serving local district nurse. The addition of the building will provide a warm space for people in the colder months, extend the range of activities we can offer, and provide income opportunities to help fund the garden's activities;
- Developing growing areas by installing more raised beds, preparing space for a cut flower garden, and adding an espalier walk formed with fruit trees;
- Developing a pond area to benefit wildlife and provide other opportunities for people to interact with and appreciate nature;
- Creating a fire pit area with seating to extend the opportunities for social activities;
- Hosting Broadwater School's bee hives on the site to support their educational programme and our wildlife; in third belong auditidments a nable of virtual administrations.
- Continuing to promote the garden through local fairs, articles, talks and events so that an an articles of visitors and regular volunteers continues to increase;
- Increasing our regular gardening sessions to 3 per week year-round, with 4 sessions for during the summer. Toward based base as a lie to elsewhere the noise door valuations.
- Holding our second open day which attracted 289 people including families and the local Mayors.

Our key achievements were as follow:-

We continued our out-reach activities and extended our links with local organisations including local uniform groups, local schools, the Surrey Youth Justice Service, National Autism Society,

Learning Spaces, Meath Epilepsy Charity. The garden was also used for forest-bathing sessions for unpaid carers, through an initiative by Roots for the Future. Through these partnerships we ensured that some of the most vulnerable people in the local area are accessing and benefiting from the garden. One example is someone who previously did not go out at all, but now attends a weekly garden session after encouragement from their family. Another example, is someone with autism who couldn't find a suitable 'fit' elsewhere for volunteering activities, who is now a regular visitor and expresses their enthusiasm for the project.

We also continued to promote volunteering and continued to host a number of Duke of additional student volunteers. Some of the continued and most another of Duke of additional student volunteers.

We conducted our second survey of garden attendees in Spring 2025. Respondents ranged in a set age group, gender and employment status.

People responded that they are learning new gardening skills and that the garden is a good source of knowledge. The survey highlighted that people want to know more about future plans and progress on projects. Activities around creative projects were also suggested.

Future Plans

Over the next year our aims are to achieve the following:

- Finish developing the wildlife pond;
- Develop the wood-working area and associated workshops to offer different learning plant opportunities for people to engage with the garden;
- Try and ensure that the garden is used most days during the week and that the building is fully utilised and supports our charitable objectives;
- Continue to work towards making the site accessible for all install more seating around the site, and provide clear signage;
- Continue to develop the annual plan of activities for the garden;
- Continue to develop links with other local charities, schools and services, and involve the wider community through workshops and events;
- Continue to evidence the impact of what we do, evaluating and continually improving.

Challenges may include:

 Trying to ensure a wide range of people can access the garden – this will be helped by developing our partnerships;

- the successful recruitment and retention of Lead Volunteers so that we can maintain and and extend our opening; and extend our opening; and extend our opening;
- Ensuring that the necessary skills/expertise is available to meet high needs groups/individuals this may mean employing a qualified professional, and volunteer training.

Financial Review

The charity received grants from the Your Fund Surrey grants programme which was supported by Cllr Penny Rivers; and donations from the Denningburg Centre, Gorringes Funeral Directors and Waitrose.

We also received fruit tree donations from the Surrey County Council Tree Grant scheme for the espalier walk. The garden also benefitted from volunteer time, plants and seeds from Network Rail and Octavius and their staff.

We have been fortunate to receive wonderful support from local organisations, including nob Squires through their 'Love where you live' scheme. In the standard of the same and the same an

Donations were also received from individuals through various initiatives, including a sponsored walk undertaken by a volunteer, a quiz night, plant sales and a wreath-making workshop.

The garden has managed to build up unrestricted reserves to cover running costs for at least 60 9W months.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE FARNCOMBE COMMUNITY GARDEN

I report to the trustees on my examination of the financial statements of Farncombe Community garden (the charity) for the period to 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2025 as set out on pages 6 to 7.

Responsibilities and basis of report

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements. The Charity's trustees consider an audit is not required for this financial period under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.
